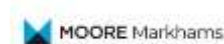

5.1 Independent Assurance Practitioner's Review Report

To the Members of Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University Rugby Football Club Inc

We have reviewed the accompanying performance report of Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University Rugby Football Club Inc on pages 6 to 17, which comprises of the entity information, the statement of service performance, the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year ended 31 August 2021, the statement of financial position as at 31 August 2021, and the statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information.

The responsibility of the Executive Committee for the performance report

The Executive Committee are responsible on behalf of the entity for:

- a) identifying suitable outcomes and outputs and quantification methods where practicable to report in the statement of service performance
- b) the preparation and fair presentation of the performance report in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) Standard issued in New Zealand by the New Zealand Accounting Standards Board, and
- c) for such internal control as the Executive Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the performance report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Assurance Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the performance report. We conducted our review of the financial information (consisting of the statement of financial performance, statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report) in accordance with International Standard on Review Engagements (New Zealand) (ISRE (NZ)) 2400, "Review of Historical Financial Statements Performed by an Assurance Practitioner who is not the Auditor of the Entity", and the review of the non-financial information (consisting of the entity information and statement of service performance) in accordance with the International Standard on Assurance Engagements (New Zealand) ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Those standards require us to conclude whether anything has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the performance report, taken as a whole, is not prepared in all material respects in accordance with the Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) Standard. Those standards also require that we comply with ethical requirements.

A review of the Performance Report in accordance with ISRE (NZ) 2400 and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised) is a limited assurance engagement. A review of the statement of service performance also involves performing procedures to obtain evidence and evaluating the suitability of the reported outcomes, outputs and quantification methods used. We performed procedures, primarily consisting of making enquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applied analytical procedures, and evaluated the evidence obtained. The procedures selected depend on our judgement, including the areas identified where a material misstatement is likely to arise.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less than those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on the performance report.

Other than in our capacity as assurance practitioner we have no relationship with, or interests in, Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that this performance report does not present fairly, in all material respects, the entity information and the financial position of Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc as at 31 August 2021 and its financial performance, cash flows and service performance for the year then ended in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) Standard.

Emphasis of Matter

We draw attention to Note 8 in the performance report, which states that the Wellington College Old

Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc incurred a deficit in the year to 31 August 2021 of \$40,588. As stated in Note 8, these events or conditions, along with other matters as set forth in Note 8, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc's ability to continue as a going concern. Our conclusion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University Rugby Football Club Inc For the year ended 31 August 2021

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting entity

The performance report presented here is for the entity Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc, incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

Nature of business

The entity is engaged in providing services as a rugby union club. The nature of the entity's business has not changed during the year under review.

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in these financial statements are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. This performance report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Historical cost

This performance report has been prepared on a historical cost basis.

Presentation Currency

The Performance Report is presented in New Zealand dollars (NZ\$) and all values are rounded to the nearest NZ\$.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Revenue Recognition

Donations and grants with no "use or return" condition attached are recorded as revenue when cash is received.

Donations and grants with a "use or return" condition attached are recorded as a liability when cash is received, and as the conditions are met the liability is reduced and revenue is recorded.

Donated goods or services are not recorded.

Fundraising revenue is recorded when cash is received (is no "use or return" condition is attached). Fees and subscriptions from members are recorded in the year to which it relates.

Interest income is recorded as it is earned.

Trade Receivables

Trade receivables are initially measured at the amount owed. When it is likely that the amount owed, or some portion, will not be collected, an impairment adjustment is recorded. Interest charged on overdue amounts are added to the individual debtor balance

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has an obligation which can be reliably measured at balance date as a result of a past event and it is probable that the company will be required to settle the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at balance date. Movements in the best estimate are recorded in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Loans

Loans are recorded when the amount borrowed has been received and measured at cost. Interest expense is recognised on an accruals basis.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Wellington College Old Boys & Victoria University of Wellington Rugby Football Club Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Items of property, plant and equipment are initially recognised at cost. Historic cost includes items of expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

Items of property, plant and equipment are subsequently measured either under the cost model (Cost or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions less accumulated depreciation and impairment).

All other repairs and maintenance expenditure is recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line / diminishing value basis over the estimated useful life of the asset. The following estimated depreciation rates /useful lives have been used:

Plant and equipment 16% - 50% SL & DV

An item of property, plant and equipment or investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year the asset is derecognised.

12 OBU / VUW Academy

The 12 week 2021 OBU Academy programme commenced in March and concluded in July. Staff and students were unfortunately again affected by the challenges associated with the Covid pandemic. However, the group continued to sustain high performance standards despite the ever changing environment and associated limitations. 22 athletes began with one more joining later to bring the total group of 23.

The 2021 programme included 23 athletes;

- 6 Premier/Premier Reserve players (*Swindale Shield 2021*)
- 10 Colts players (*Paris Memorial Cup, John E Kelly Memorial Cup, JRD Memorial Cup 2021 Finals*)
- 7 Impalas players

Across 2021 we continued to see players be selected to represent higher honours to continue on their rugby journeys. The Academy programme continues to be highly valued by students and vital part of their student and rugby experience.

Personal Development

The Personal Development strand of the Academy was impacted by the covid restrictions at times in 2021, restricting our ability to invite and host some more significant speaking events. Taking the learnings and recommendations from 2020 on board, the 2021 programme included a heavy focus on wellbeing for the athletes.

Guest speakers within our OBU and VUW were targeted as guest speakers to utilise the experience and resources of trusted people within our networks. From this, we were able to further educate the student athletes about the resources available within the wider community at the University.

A special mention to the diverse speakers we had, who inspired our student athletes to connect with the OBU/VUW community further and motivated them to live what they had learnt from our speakers. Academy members are continuously encouraged to demonstrate the selflessness and caring for others as they represent OBU and the University.

Strength and Conditioning

Strength and conditioning was a hugely successful aspect of the Academy for 2021. Players were rewarded for their hard work and discipline with impressive improvements in their testing results. Shifting to the recently renovated Functional Training room contributed significantly to the success of the S&C programme. The new space allowed the athletes to train as one, allowing Robbie (S&C trainer) to easily guide and help with technique where required. Robbie delivered this component of the programme at the high performance level, his knowledge and professionalism is a great asset to the Academy which we hope to retain next year. The administrative support he offered during the athlete interviews was also hugely valuable. A recommendation for 2022 is to consider establishing a rehab space at Boyd Wilson to allow for injured and recovering players the opportunity to work on their bodies while the rest of the team are undertaking other academy activities.

Technical Training

The Technical training component of the Academy continued to be well-received by participants in 2021, however there were some difficulties in being able to secure volunteer support coaches with the technical trainings due to Covid and not being able to plan schedules with alert level changes.

An ongoing challenge is being able to cater to the different levels of skills and experience within the athletes, and only having one specialist coach.

However the technical sessions are a crucial part of the programme to help develop and educate the athletes' on field rugby specific skills, and it is an advantage to focus on repetition of micro skills.

A highlight from these sessions was the impact on our female athletes and this was valuable for their development and improvement, as well as confidence in their understanding of the game.

Volunteer work and giving back

Another step forward with our Academy was having a large number of our athletes giving back, by helping Trapper (Dave Loveridge) and Tomasi Palu with primary school visits for Wellington Community Rugby. Also with the motivational speaking from Chris Te'o, part of the Academy koha was to donate funds which have bought a bike to add to the Uso Bike library, which is a programme which goes into primary schools and teaches children how to ride bikes.

The Professional Development and progress of the the academy program has been a vital part to be the leading academy that gives back and serves our communities of Aotearoa.

Developing the Women's game

The most noticeable element in the programme's feedback this year was regarding the women's team environment and how this has been significantly affected by a cohort of players and management not returning to the club in 2021. This weighed heavily on our female Academy players, which meant the experience for those new to the club had their development on and off the field suffer slightly. The women were very specific about what they wanted the Academy to focus on to make their next season better in their feedback, these recommendations will also be passed back to the club committee for consideration. The Academy was able to help with the development of the individual game, however the Club teams management and training is separate from the Academy.

OBU in conjunction with Victoria University had entered a women's 7's team into the 2021 UTSNZ National 7's tournament held in Lincoln in early September. The team had trialled, were training and in the midst of fundraising, however, with the return of an alert level 4 lockdown the event had to be cancelled.

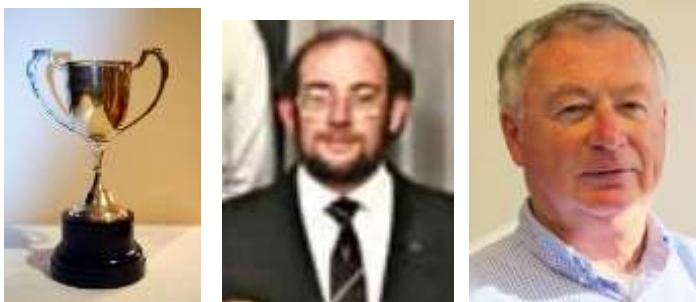

Donald Bruce Barrowman

1931 – 2021

VUWRFC Life Member #13

VUWRFC Club Captain 1965 -72. Esteemed Hooker for University 1st XV 1956 - 1959

The OBU Club was saddened to note the death on 15 March 2021 of Life Member and former Club Captain of VUWRFC, Donald Bruce Barrowman. He was 90 years of age.

Don was born in Ngongotaha in 1931 and raised in Wellington. He attended Wellington College, followed by Teachers College in Kelburn and then Victoria University. His first teaching appointment was in the township of Wimbledon, a remote settlement 100 kilometres by road, east of Pahiatua. From Wimbledon, he played provincial rugby for the Bush Union, an involvement that meant frequent and lengthy travel over difficult roads for team activity in Pahiatua. He played 14 matches for Bush and in 1953 was selected as a hooker for the All Black trials and came close to selection for the All Blacks.

In 1965 he moved back to Wellington and joined the University Club. The timing fitted in well as VUW was losing the services of long-time hooker Denis McHalick. Whilst with the senior team from 1956 to 1959, the team won the Jubilee Cup in 1958. He was selected for the Wellington representative team in 1958 and North Island Universities in 1959. He completed studies for award of the BA degree in 1964.

Don was a vigorous player, and his ability to win tight heads was a special benefit for the team, often leading to a winning advantage. Winning a tight head was not easy and was a relatively rare occurrence. His skills in this area have been noted in John Anderson's Club history (page 96) when in 1957 he achieved the winning of a remarkable seven tight heads against Hutt in the opening game for the senior team that season.

During the three decades of the nineteen fifties, sixties and seventies, the University Club was fortunate to have extraordinary leadership from a series of outstanding Club Captains. From 1952 to 1964 there was the legendary Roy Hansen. He was followed by Don Barrowman from 1965 to 1972. This was a time of great expansion of the Club membership, triggered by the success of the University club during the golden years of the mid-fifties. Don was closely involved in all team activities over all grades and was very successful with bringing all players in all grades back to the Club rooms at the Boyd Wilson field each Saturday night for a joyous celebration.

Those Saturday nights were truly memorable get togethers with a marvelous atmosphere helped by good catering and a huge open fire in the Club meeting room for comfort during the winter evenings. Don's enthusiastic leadership was halted in 1973 following the unfortunate death of his wife Judy in a motor accident that year. Don was elevated to the small group of Life Members of the Club soon afterwards.

Don was highly respected as a school teacher and primary school headmaster. He had leadership roles at schools at Owhiro Bay, South Wellington Intermediate, Paparangi, Island Bay and Cashmere Avenue. It is noteworthy also that two of Don's children have been most significant contributors to activities at Victoria University of Wellington. Son Fergus Barrowman has been head of Victoria University Press for several years. Daughter Rachel Barrowman has been a distinguished scholar (J D Stout Fellow 2000) and writer. She was the author of the outstanding history publication prepared for the centennial of Victoria University.

Reilly's Rabble, the team named after him, had its origins in 1961 when Terry played for the Victoria University Rugby side 3rd grade team. In 1964 Terry took over the running of the team and the recruiting of players. With so many ring ins along with the assortment of jerseys that the team turned out in each week led the Club captain at the time, Don Barrowman, to name the side 'Reilly's Rabble'. Reilly's Rabble continued until the late 1990's with Terry being captain throughout the entire period.

Terry also contributed to the administration of OBU RFC being on the committee 1992 to 1995 and was Auditor from 2007 to 2017. Terry was made a Vice President in 2018.

Terry passed away after a short illness in June 2021.

Vern joined the Wellington College Old Boys Rugby Football Club in 1951 and played through the grades finally playing for the Senior side in the mid to late 1950's as a loose forward. Once retired he became a regular attender of the senior game's week in week out.

In 1978, along with two other members of the club, he helped set up the Wellington College Old Boys Rugby Football Supporters Club which operated very successfully for about 6 years. The club ran many raffles to raise funds to purchase an ex-NZ Railways bus which was used to transport supporters to and from the senior matches each Saturday and was also hired by the Wellington Rugby Union to take the Wellington Representative team to matches in the lower half of the North Island. Vern obtained his passenger service licence, along with 7 other members of the club and became a very accomplished bus driver!

Vern went on to become the Manager of the Senior team during the time Brian Cuff was coach. He created a great team spirit and whilst the team never won the Jubilee Cup it was a very happy team and they played some great rugby.

For the last 30 plus years, Vern lived in Waikanae with his wife Joy, but during the club Rugby season there would have had to have been a major disaster to have stopped him from coming into the city to watch his beloved rugby club playing in the Premier Competition.

Only towards the end of last season was his absence noted and that was due to failing health.

Vern was a very popular member of the OBURFC, always happy and smiling (particularly when we started winning the Jubilee Cup in latter years) and a great contributor to the Rugby discussions post match.

An OBURFC member to the core, he will be greatly missed
